In November 2002, 6 ship operators formed a union named SARPC (Syndicat des Armements Réunionnais de Palangriers Congélateurs), an independent member of the UAPF union (Union des Armateurs à la Pêche de France), whose aim is to work together on the perpetuation of the resource and the protection of the environment. In 2013, SARPC created the Fondation des mers australes, a foundation that supports environmental projects in the Southern Ocean.

The Kerguelen and Crozet fishing zones are managed and regulated by M.N.H.N (Museum national d'Histoire Naturelle) and the TAAF administration, who set the Total Allowable Catch in line with CCAMLR Harvest Control rules. The allocation of quotas to each ship is based upon specific criteria such as:

- Protection of the resource and the environment
- Efficiency in reducing

seabird mortality

- Respect of regulations
- Ability to fish the allocated quota
- Respect of social and economic standards.

7 French flagged ships are legally allowed to fish in these zones and unload their catch in Reunion Island. Strict rules and regulations are set by the TAAF administration to fish in these zones:

- Each vessel must have a fish controller on board.
- Fishing season runs from September 1 to August 31 each year. The ships make 3 to 4 fishing trips during

each season.

- Presence of an independent inspector is mandatory for each unloading and storing as well as the loading of each container due to be exported.

In 2013, the Kerguelen Islands fishery received independent MSC certification as a sustainable and well managed fishery. Crozet received its MSC certification in 2017. Both were re-certified in 2018.

Complementary to their work as fishermen, the crews are strongly involved in the protection of the resource & the environment and fight against IUU fishing.
